How can we communicate better with parents at KS3?

The implementation of ClassCharts this year has played a significant role in recognising and commending the character strengths exhibited by our students. This app allows parents to access the logs made by students, attendance marks and homework on a daily basis.

This year we also changed the way we report KS3 progress – you will have received students assessment scores for each subject. We hope that moving away from a statement such as 'working at their level' to providing a percentage score allows parents and students to more clearly see where they are at in each subject.

We are also really looking forward to our new year 12's starting in September after a positive Sixth Form induction, and to take our current year 12's into year 13. We have many thrilling trips planned for next year, one every term, and we hope that you will join us. Studying, academic progress and success will always be a priority for our Sixth Form students, but we all need some fun and time away from our studies from time to time to ensure that we keep our wellbeing in check.

We are super proud of our new Sixth Form Leadership group this year, which has been established by Mr Neeve. You have provided us with many insights and have started to bring about change, which we hope you will benefit from next academic year. We are making changes to 6th Form Mentor Time, own clothes day once a week, A new rewards system, and students will each be receiving a lanyard- to name but a few. Meanwhile, our curriculum ambassador team have been looking at the learning taking place in the classrooom and offering student voice to leadership and heads of department to allow us to understand their views. As a result of their input we have taken some of the successes they reported from Maths and Science and begun to implement these in other subjects.

Aylesford school is part of the Character Education Trust (CET) and proud to be the holder of the Quality Mark Plus award for Character Education. 
